The Hole on the Hill

Summer 2010

As reported in the winter edition of 'The Hill', some subsidence appeared in January in the 'bomb crater' at the top of the hill. If you go on the hill you will see that the whole of the crater has now been fenced off.

Bristol Parks commissioned a report from Bristol Coalmining Archives and sought the advice of a structural engineer. The report states that 'the circular area, essentially flat with a rim of made ground around the centre is typical of abandoned shafts throughout the coalfield'. As described on our website History page, there are known to be mines under Troopers Hill. Friends of Troopers Hill have a copy of a plan of the Fireclay mine that was abandoned in 1908. This mine was accessed by a near horizontal tunnel running from near the river. Bristol Coalmining Archives suggest in their report that this tunnel could have been dug originally to drain an earlier mine that dates from the 1700s. Comparing the location of our shaft with the mine plan, it does appear to be above the access tunnel to the fireclay mine.

Bristol Coalmining Archives' conclusion was that it was likely to be a mine shaft dug in the 1700s and if so, it was likely to have been about 140 feet deep going down to the Buff Vein.

On the advice of their structural engineer, Bristol Parks have now asked for quotes to carry out the drilling of bore holes to establish whether there are any substantial voids under the ground, or whether the subsidence is simply due to the fill in the old mine shaft consolidating over time. We have a <u>page on</u> <u>our website</u> that will be updated as more information becomes available.

If you would like to know more about mining under the hill, we will have copies of the mine plans and other information on view at the Music on the Hill event in June.

Tai Chi on the Hill

Tracey Morgan visits Troopers Hill

Tracey Morgan is Bristol City Council Service Director for Environment and Leisure. She visited Troopers Hill to find out how Friends are working with Bristol Parks to maintain our Local Nature Reserve. Ed.

I visited Troopers Hill in the aftermath of snow in January this year. This was my first visit to the Hill and I was pleased to see the level of engagement and commitment from the Friends Group. I was given a brief history of the Hill, saw the way the park was designed to attract wildlife, the natural space used for dog walkers, the newly designed children's play area and the spectacular views

I have also been very impressed by the commitment of the friends group to drive forward improvements and events for Troopers Hill and also work with the City Council to put in place better procedures for responding to requirements that the community have.

Environment and Leisure are keen to listen to the needs of the community and respond accordingly. I believe that the Friends group for Troopers Hill have been very influential and have established a good mechanism for working with the Local Area Management teams. We are using this mechanism as a model for engagement, and more recently have had a number of other Park Groups asking for the same level of commitment from the Council to their areas, which we are currently doing.

Bristol Smartcard Trial

Bristol is running a small Smartcard trial on selected bus services to test customer experience of the technology ahead of the launch of a regional scheme funded by the government.

 \mathbf{T} he council aims to start the trial in June and people who use the services should be able to apply for a card from late May.

The trial will test the technology so that the council, the University of the West of England and their public transport delivery partners can understand more about the benefits and the logistics. It is funded by $\pounds 20,000$ of council funding.

The smartcard safely stores up to ± 50 cash, and each time it is used it automatically gives the holder a 16% discount off of the cost of the standard cash fare.

Bus operator Wessex Connect is to run the

smartcard trial on the Long Ashton and Portway Park & Ride services and council supported bus services listed below:

•517 Avonmouth - Emersons Green
•518 Shirehampton - Emersons Green
•584 Kingswood - Sea Mills
•585 Bristol City Centre - Sea Mills

•586 Bristol City Centre - Hotwells

·587 Kingswood - Hotwells

The card can also be used on the <u>Ulink buses</u>. In fact, the trial is an expansion of the successful UWE smart-card scheme used on the intercampus services via the centre of Bristol.

Wessex Connect's buses are kitted out with the correct ticket machines and back office system at no cost to the council. If the trial is successful Wessex Connect plan to include all of the services that they operate in the Bristol and Bath area.

Passengers can use their card to store up to $\pounds 50$ in cash to pay for their day to day bus travel. They can also use it as a season ticket for either one, three or 12 months of regular travel on the service of their choice.

<u>Councillor Jon Rogers</u>, Executive Member for Transport and Sustainability, said: "People are impatient for this technology and the regional scheme may be some time in the offing. In the meantime, there's a lot we can learn about the technology and a lot of benefits we can offer for a fairly low investment."

All buses included in the trial are fitted with a card reader, when the smartcard is placed on the reader the amount of money on the card will be displayed and the passenger should ask the driver for a ticket in the normal way. The cost of the fare will be deducted from the balance on the card and the driver will issue a ticket, which will display the new card balance.

The smartcard can be loaded with cash up to $\pounds 20$ on the bus, or larger amounts by visiting or posting the smartcard to Brunel House or the Wessex Connect depot. The smartcard can be recharged as often as necessary. There is no need for the passenger to request a new card unless it is lost or damaged.
