Forgive us if we give ourselves a little bit of a pat on the back, because they went on to say: "The 'friends are in some ways the 'crown' in the management of the site. They are a very positive, strong and hard working group of enthusiasts, always looking for areas of positive improvements and organisation of specific special events to increase the use and enjoyment of the Nature Reserve." All of that said, it is inevitable that over time a group's numbers drop as people move away or become involved in other things — like family. ## An Important letter from Bristol Parks.

I am writing to ensure that you are aware of the Area Green Space Plan consultation process that is currently in progress up to 29th October. Area Green Space Plans set out a range of ideas about how our green spaces can be improved, where facilities and different types of space might be provided and in some cases where green space might no longer be needed.

These are important documents for anyone that has an interest in parks, uses one or would like to but don't currently. They are certainly important documents for people that are committed enough to their park that they have become a member of a park group or similar.

**W**e have obviously triggered a great deal of interest in the potential open space disposals set out in Area Green Space Plans and I can assure you that is welcome. However, I am as keen to ensure that park group members respond to the investment ideas we have set out - the majority of which have been put forward by members of your community. Giving us feedback on these might make it easier to take some good suggestions forward from here.

#### Works on Troopers Hill Road

Work is planned for mid October to remove some of the earth that has been falling from the Hill onto Troopers Hill Rd. This will also involve removing sections of the fence where soil has built up behind it. The aim is to reduce the risk of the fence collapsing and the soil falling onto the road in a large heap. Some vegetation removal will be necessary to expose the soil.

This work will need traffic management, either traffic lights or stop-go boards but they will probably only need to be in place while the works are in progress and not overnight. It is unfortunate that this will be happening while Conham Hill is closed and Troopers Hill Rd is likely to be busier, but it has to be done outside the bird nesting season and with the risk of a major soil fall we would not want it to be delayed by a year which is the only other option.

There is also a need for some tree management works to be done in the area to remove dead or diseased trees, cut short, where appropriate, other trees so they regrow (coppice) and take lower branches off other specific trees. This will also reduce

the risk of tree branches being hit by large vehicles. This work has been recommended by Bristol Parks tree officers. When we have raised the problem of low branches before, we have always been told that there is no money because removal of dead and dying branches or trees in parks takes priority in Health & Safety terms. The cost of the traffic management needed has been one of the factors.

There is obviously an opportunity to get this work done more cheaply by using the traffic management that will be in place for the soil works. Friends of Troopers Hill have therefore applied to the Neighbourhood Partnership for funding for the tree works and this will be considered at the next Partnership meeting on 13 September. If the application is successful the tree works will be carried out at the same time as the other works.

#### **ABC of Troopers Hill**

**G** is for Grass

The grassland on Troopers Hill is unique in the city. The acid soil provides the growing conditions preferred by certain grasses, some of which have wonderful names. Some of my favourites are Wavy Hair-grass, Sheep's Fescue, and Yorkshire Fog.

**G**rasses belong to a group of flowering plants known as Monocotyledons. The group is characterized by the veins in the leaves running parallel to each other (lilies, onions), distinguishing them from the other main group, Dicotyledons, whose leaves display branching veins.

Troopers Hill grass provides a home to three types of grasshopper, including the Mottled Grasshopper which is rarely found in Bristol, as well as the Meadow Grasshopper and the Field Grasshopper. Among the other insects living in the grass are three kinds of bush cricket – the Conehead, the Speckled Bush Cricket and the Dark Bush Cricket. By the way, you can tell a cricket from a grasshopper by their antennae – the cricket's antennae are long, while grasshoppers have short stubby antennae.

#### **Old Mineshaft Repairs Started**

**W**ork has now started on excavating and subsequently sealing the hollow on Troopers Hill, formerly known as the "Bomb Crater".

The shallow dip, which overlooks Sally's Glade, was originally thought to have been caused by a bomb dropped during the war as it was in line with bombs known to have fallen on the allotments. The area was a major target because of Butler's Tar Works, at the bottom of the Hill.

However, it now seems likely that it is actually being caused by the settlement or collapse of an old mine shaft. The shaft may also coincide with the path of a later, horizontal fireclay mine tunnel that also ran under Troopers Hill. The dip may have been gradually sinking lower for many years but was only noticed earlier this year when Friends observed that an area in the middle had suddenly dropped. This area has since sunk even further.

The Coal Board has accepted ownership of the problem, which means they will pay for the remedial work now being carried out.

The repair will involve removing the ground on top of the dip, down to the level of in-fill remaining underneath. A cap of about 400mm of concrete will then be put on the hole and the soil replaced. We will not know how long the work will take until the initial excavation has been carried out.
