GREEN FLAG AWARD - WE DID IT!


Troopers Hill Local Nature Reserve, along with the Downs in Clifton, is now a Green Flag Award Winner! This scheme sets a standard which parks and green spaces have to reach. Several key criteria are used - is the site a welcoming place for visitors, is it clean and well maintained, how it is managed and how much community involvement there is? The assessment process takes account of the fact that sites differ and that somewhere like Troopers Hill would not have the same facilities as a formal park. On Troopers Hill the judges liked the fact that we had provided a surfaced wheelchair path and benches at the top of the hill while maintaining the wild character of the rest of the site. The judging took place in May, on a day when Troopers Hill was looking really good in the Spring sunshine. The judges were very complimentary both about the hill and the work of the Friends of Troopers Hill. One of our lizards put in an appearance and we saw a green woodpecker and lots of ladybird larvae on the steps from Troopers Hill Rd.

f This is the first time for several years that Bristol Parks has put sites forward to be assessed for a Green Flag. Three were chosen: Troopers Hill, The Downs and Queens Square (which unfortunately wasn't successful). Work towards the Green Flag started in the autumn with Phil Williamson putting in many extra hours to re-write our Management Plan and bringing it up to Green Flag standards. At the same time John Threadgold and Sally Oldfield were finalising the work that was to be done to clear areas of scrub and bramble and fell some trees in accordance with the recommendations of the various naturalists who have visited and surveyed the site over the past few years. Friends were fully involved in this process with Phil and Sally coming to our meeting in January and we held our own meeting to review the Management Plan shortly afterwards. Many of our comments were incorporated into the final document.

In the weeks leading up to the judging John and Bristol Parks' Contractors, Bristol Contract Services (BCS,) were kept very busy completing the wheelchair path and dealing with many other maintenance issues. I had several meetings with John, Sally and Phil over this period and I was impressed by the amount of effort they were putting in. Dave, Julian and the rest of the team at BCS also played their part; it was clear that they were taking a real interest in the site and felt responsible for it.

The Green Flag Award doesn't mean that Troopers Hill is perfect. Everyone acknowledges that more work is needed: some of the steps need replacing; the entrances from Troopers Hill Road need improving and there is still too



to cancel the concert as the weather forecast made it pretty plain that the weather was going to be terrible with torrential rains, wind and a severe weather warning in place. We have booked the South Gloucestershire Youth Jazz Orchestra again for next year, so let's hope for better conditions on June 28th 2008.

Those of you who walk the Hill regularly will soon meet and get to know a new regular face - Julian Thomas of Bristol Contract Services. Julian has just been awarded "Contract Services Employee of the year" by Bristol City Council and is now looking after Eastwood Farm, Callington Road and Troopers Hill on a regular basis. He hopes to be on-site roughly twice a week, though that will vary according to needs with us and the other sites. It's very good news for the Hill and will give much needed continuity as he will be able to take care of jobs that are too big for us to handle, but can be dealt with without bringing in a full team. He has already been busy cutting grass and clearing persistent bramble using a power strimmer. We welcome him warmly and are delighted he is joining us in looking after our Hill.

Are you passionate about Bristol's parks and green spaces? Then now is your chance to let the city council know what you think about its draft strategy for the future. It covers a number of key issues and a ten-week consultation period began on Monday, July 23. Residents will have the chance to read all about Bristol's ambitious draft plans - and comment on what they think is the best way forward. 



HAVE YOUR SAY ON THE FUTURE

On Friday, 6 July a major new public consultation exercise was launched by Bristol City Council to give people the chance to influence the Bristol Development Framework - an overarching set of documents which will help guide and manage growth and change in the city over the next 20 years. Change in Bristol is happening quickly; an extra 60,400 jobs, 28,000 new homes and 10% increase in population (39,700) by 2026.

There are two important documents that you are being asked to comment on:

- The Statement of Community Involvement sets out who the council wants to get involved in plan making and development issues and how they want to involve them.
- The Core Strategy Issues and Options paper. highlights 18 key issues which need to be addressed in shaping Bristol's future, including economic, social and environmental changes. It also proposes three options for the direction of growth within the city.

The Issues and Options paper will be asking people how they think Bristol can best accommodate the growth in homes, jobs and services that will take place between now and 2026. These options for where growth might take place within the city are: "In the city centre and spread fairly evenly across the whole of Bristol", "Focused on an expanded city centre" or lastly "Based around substantial development in South Bristol".

You are also being asked about how residential development might take place in the city. What land should be used, what types of accommodation should be provided and what can be done to encourage more affordable housing?

The views received will then help shape the Core Strategy Preferred Options to be published in December.

To get involved in the consultation process, download the documents and questionnaires from the council's website: www.bristol.gov.uk/bdf. Documents can also be picked up from the Planning reception, Brunel House, St George's Road; the Council House, College Green. All libraries in the city will also have the information needed to take part in the consultation process.
