So why do we need a Facebook page? What is Facebook and what is it used for?

What is Facebook?

Facebook is a free Social networking website. It was founded in the United States in 2004. Millions of people use Facebook everyday to keep up with friends, upload an unlimited number of photos, share links and videos, and learn more about the people they meet. Everyone can sign up for an account and can put as much, or as little, personal information on their profile as they wish.

Why do Friends of Troopers Hill need a Face-book page?

A few years ago every company was rushing to create their own website and now all the major companies have large media departments using every method possible to advertise. This includes Facebook and Twitter. Non personal pages can be set up for business or commercial use. Individuals can then 'like' (and thereby promote) pages they are interested in.

The advantage of Friends of Troopers Hill using Facebook is that everyone who 'likes' the page will get updates every time something is posted on the Wall or a new event is created. Any last minute changes to events can immediately be communicated via this medium. Everyone who 'likes' the page can also write on the wall and post photos. Undiscovered Brislington

 ${f T}$ here's a secret world right in the middle of Brislington. Wedged unassumingly between

densely crowded streets, the Brislington Brook corridor is lush, green, wooded valley, hidden away from the hustle and bustle of city life. It feels like a lost and forgotten land, often unknown by many of the people who live close by and brimming with discoveries to be made.

The Brislington Community Partnership (BCP) has re-

ceived 3 years funding from the Heritage Lottery and Bristol City Council (BCC) for an exciting new community project. "Discover Brislington Brook" aims to bring the river to life and enable people to discover its history and wildlife through fun activities, walks, talks and events.

 ${f T}$ he river runs through Whitchurch, Stockwood, Brislington and St Annes, connecting these communities and acting as an invaluable wildlife corridor. As well as it's great environmental value the brook has a fascinating history, the remains of which are evident everywhere; ranging from St Anne's Holy Well - a 13th century pilgrimage site; to the remnants of a Victorian pleasure garden.

Ecologically, the stream plays a vital role; a recent wildlife survey even found evidence of otters! Other creatures spotted include kingfishers, dippers, bats, owls, badgers and deer.

 ${f T}$ here'll be many opportunities to join in;

from river clear-ups to a performance recreating the Pilgrim's Way. The first event is a bat themed fun day and evening story walk aimed at local people and families on Wednesday 26th October, 2:00-6:30pm at the Wicklea Centre on Wick Rd.

Troopers Hill Awarded Green Flag— Again

For the fifth year in succession, Troopers Hill has again been awarded a <u>Green Flag.</u> Several Friends were present at St Andrews Park, who were awarded a flag for the first time, along with representatives of Netham Park, Blaise Castle Estate, Queen's Square, St Paul's Park, Ashton Court Estate and the Downs to receive our flag. The Hill remains the first and only Nature Reserve in Bristol to be awarded this coveted distinction.

ABC of Troopers Hill

J is for Julian (also known as Jules), who is employed by Bristol Council Parks department to look after Troopers Hill Local Nature Reserve. He spends two days a week, on average, on the Hill, the remainder of his time is shared with Eastwood Farm and Callington Road LNRs. Among other things, he takes care of strimming and mowing, path clearing, fence mending and waste disposal. He also deals with the huge sacks of bramble, prunings and other vegetation that result from Friends' conservation work parties.

Friends of Troopers Hill hold Jules in high esteem for his understanding of the terrain, plants and animals living on the Hill, and his sympathetic and imaginative management of the site for human access and enjoyment. He solves problems, and provides expert advice and guidance on the best use of Friends' volunteer hours in achieving the aims in the Troopers Hill management plan http://www.troopers-hill.org.uk/plan.htm. In 2009 Jules (with his Bristol Parks colleague Oli) received a 'Thanks for supporting the sector' award from VOSCUR (Voluntary Organisations Standing Conference on Urban Regeneration) - the principal voluntary body co-ordinator for Bristol.

In his own time, Jules is keen on the dramatic arts (especially Shakespeare), is a sponsor of the Tobacco Factory theatre, and is involved in bringing the benefits of drama and literature to young people. Jules' birthday falls in September, so we send him thanks for all his endeavours along with our very best wishes. Happy birthday Jules!
