THE ST GEORGE NEIGHBOURHOOD PARTNERSHIP

Neighbourhood Partnerships (NPs) are a government led initiative and Bristol Council has been a strong supporter of the scheme. The NPs exist so that people can have more of a say in the important issues for their area: St George NP covers the council wards of St George East and St George West. On behalf of Friends of Troopers Hill, Susan has been attending St George Neighbourhood Partnership meetings since the group started last November.

The Partnership holds 3 public meetings a year, when people can raise local issues that they are concerned about. Those issues are then followed up and progress reported at the next meeting. Items raised so far have ranged from the lack of youth provision and community facilities in Speedwell, to replacing street trees in Kensington Rd. Good progress has been made and the St George group has already had direct influence on services provided by council and public sector bodies, such as the police.

Friends of Troopers Hill have been very interested in having a voice in the Partnership because the NP will be consulted next year about the Bristol Parks and Green Space Strategy, as it affects St George.

The next public meeting will be on Wednesday 12th November at 7pm so please do come along to hear what has been achieved and raise the priorities that concern you. If you would like to see what happens in detail behind the scenes between the public meetings, you can come to one of the steering group meetings. Contact Susan if you would like more information.

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It was with great regret that we had to cancel the "Bugs and Beasties" event in August. The weather was simply too bad. Apart from the risk of children slipping on wet grass, the bugs could also have been harmed by wet catch nets. As it is a very popular event, we may well try again next year. We're delighted to announce that Troopers Hill has been awarded a Green Flag again. Along with the Hill, the Downs (also for the second time), Blaise Castle Estate and Queen Square were successful in receiving this prestigious award. It underlines the continuing improvements the Council is achieving in the quality of Bristol's open spaces.

As you know, deer are sometimes seen on the Hill. Whilst it is not a huge problem, we would like to remind Friends about the danger from Wood Ticks (which are carried by deer), especially in areas of long grass and bracken. Wood Ticks are associated with Lyme's Disease, which is a rare, but very unpleasant and occasionally fatal illness. It is a good idea for dog owners to check their pets as well, as they too can become hosts to these pests.



Our Tai Chi classes on the Hill have been very successful. Attendances were between 24 and 30 people each day, helped by largely favourable weather—hard to believe this year! Earlier this year Ivan Packer, a student from Bristol University, carried out a small mammal survey on the heathland and in the woods on Troopers Hill. One of the purposes of this survey was to assist management of the environment now and in the future. The survey itself is too long to repeat here, but the conclusions were quite clear; *".....It is therefore recommended that the site is managed sympathetically in order to maximise the diversity of plant and insect species as well as small mammal species. This will in turn increase the diversity in terms of the other species to be found and improve the overall ecology of the site."*

We love to hear from you, whatever the reason. Recently we received this email which we'd like to share with you.....

My parents, Ray & Joan Hodges, came from the Speedwell area of Bristol, both growing up in the early 1920s. As they were neighbours, so their friendship grew and eventually they married in Kingswood in 1941.

My Dad worked at St Anne's Board Mills until they closed in the 1980s. As a family we lived in Allison Road in Brislington and as we grew up in the area, Troopers Hill was often mentioned - especially when Dad was still working.

It is our belief that Mum and Dad used to do their courting at Troopers Hill: we took them both on a trip up the river once and Dad pointed out the area to us. From that day he always said he wanted his ashes scattered there.

Sadly Dad passed away suddenly in March this year. So in April my sisters and I carried out Dad's wishes and scattered his ashes. What a lovely spot: such fantastic views over our lovely city.

Today would have been Dad's 87th Birthday so I went with one of my daughters to the place where we said cheerio to him. While I was there, I met Susan and some Friends who were busy having a tidy up! I told them the reason why we were there and she asked me to send this to you.

Hope it makes interesting reading to you. We, as a family, shall continue to visit Troopers Hill. Long may you continue your good work.

Cutting down broom!

A lot of the work we have done at Work Parties over the past five years has been to cut back bramble where it has been covering areas of broom. The wild broom, with its yellow spring flowers, is one of the features of Troopers Hill that you will not find in such profusion anywhere else in Bristol and we want to protect it.

We now have new broom plants growing where there would otherwise have been just bramble and in the long term we hope broom will grow in some of the areas that were cleared of scrub last winter.

However... Troopers Hill LNR is only 21 acres and our aim, through the Management Plan agreed with Bristol Parks, is to keep a balance between the different types of habitat. The acid grassland and the heathland is the most important habitat since it is these areas that support the rare invertebrates that are found on the hill. It is the reason that it was declared a Local Nature Reserve in 1995. In some areas broom (and gorse) have been spreading into the heathland and grassland and so this also now needs controlling.

So, if you join us on our Work Parties this winter you might well find yourself being asked to cut down broom in some areas, while cutting bramble back to protect broom in others.
