- 1908 Troopers Hill Fireclay mine closed
- 1905 Little St Aidan's and adjoining school closed - bought by the Tar Works
- 1904 Conham Chemical Works closed - incorporated into Tar Works
Bull Inn rebuilt in new location
- 1900 William Butler dies 6 October
Tramline extension opened to Hanham, St Philip's power station switched on to power all trams
St George becomes part of the City and County of Bristol
- 1897 School pupils walk over Troopers Hill - Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee celebration
George Lacey killed in a major fire at Butlers Tar Works
- 1896 Troopers Hill Fireclay mine employs 9 underground workers
- 1895 Opening of electrified tramline to Kingswood (power station at Beaconsfield Rd depot)
- 1894 River flood 15 Nov
- 1890
- 1889 William Butler retires. Temp Smallpox hospital moved to quarry at Holmes Hill.
- 1888 Temporary smallpox hospital on Troopers Hill
- 1886 Troopers Hill leased to Bristol Fireclay Co by Elizabeth Somers
- 1885 Celebration on Troopers Hill for the election of Handel Cossham as MP (3/4,000 people)
- 1882 'a most disorderly scene' - Salvation Army vs Bristol secularists on Troopers Hill
- 1880 OS map uses name of Troopers Hill, this name was authorised by 3 local residents
- 1880 Third St George church completed
First record of Troopers Hill Fireclay mine.
- 1878 22 Dec Fire destroys second St George Church
Mass meeting of striking GW Cotton Mill workers on Troopers Hill
- 1876 Tramline to St George (World's End Public House) opened (horse drawn)
- 1875 Bristol Tramways Co formed with William Butler as chairman
- 1873 St George Local Board formed.
Visit to Troopers Hill by Cotswold Naturalists' Field Club led by Handel Cossham
- 1870
- 1863 Tar Works Fire - Works sold to William Butler
- 1862 Thomas Somers dies, his wife Elizabeth becomes owner of Troopers Hill
- 1861 Start of the American Civil War (to 1865) - cotton famine closes GW Cotton Factory
- 1860 Crews Hole Wesleyan Chapel built (later used as industrial works, now housing) - foundation stone laid 10
Sept 1860 by Archibald Vickers, Manager Great Western Cotton Factory
- 1853 Crews Hole Methodist Church built (corner Troopers Hill Rd & Crews Hole Rd).
James Michell sets up business to reprocess old copper slag.
- 1850
- 1848 Dr Benjamin Somers, owner of Troopers Hill dies
- 1846 St George church rebuilt to designs of J Hicks (second church)
- 1845 'Troopers Hill' shown on Tithe Map Troopers Hill coal mine closed by this date
- 1843 Crews Hole Tar Works established by IKB with local financiers. William Butler became manager
Elizabeth Emra dies 10th Oct a few days after the birth of her eighth child
- 1841 GWR opened from Bristol to Paddington
- 1840 Lander's Electoral Map shows 'Truebody's Hill' GWR opened from Bristol to Bath
Patent for preserving timber with creosote by John Bethell
- 1838 Great Western Cotton Factory opens in Barton Hill
- 1835 Construction of the Great Western Railway starts
- 1834 Distribution of slave compensation money to slave owners
- 1833 The Abolition of Slavery Act is passed by the British Parliament
Scenes in our Parish published in NY, Elizabeth Emra marries Marcus Holmes.
- 1832 Complete version of Scenes in our Parish published in UK (with second series)
- 1831 Bristol Riots 31st October, fires in Queen's Sq seen from St George by E Emra
- 1830 OS map published using the name 'Troopers Hill'
Scenes in our Parish by a Country Parson's Daughter (Elizabeth Emra) first series published in UK.
- 1828 Brass Company sells Crews Hole abandoned site for £1,880 to Dr Benjamin Somers
- 1826 Drawing commissioned by GW Braikenridge shows Troopers Hill Chimney
OS surveyor uses the name 'Troopers Hill' on preliminary drawing for new OS map - first recorded use
- 1820 Bristol brass company ceases copper production
- 1819 Crews Hole Pottery closes
- 1815 Napoleon defeated at Waterloo in June, ending the Napoleonic Wars
- 1813 'Truebody's Hill' offered for sale.
- 1812 Anthony Ammat builds Crews Hole Pottery (it was beside the river opposite Lamb Hill)

- 1810 Kennet and Avon canal completed linking Bristol to the Thames
Revd John Emra becomes vicar of St George (to 1842)
- 1809 Completion of Floating Harbour and Feeder Canal
Manufacture of copper and brass ceases at Warmley
- 1807 25 March, transatlantic slave trade abolished by the British Parliament
- 1805 Battle of Trafalgar on 21 October
- 1804 Elizabeth Emra born 20th Nov
- 1803 Maule's map shows Copper Works at the base of the Hill, lower chimney/engine house is not shown,
Troopers Hill colliery probably established after this time.
- 1800 1800 Sale of glassworks (the glassworks was near the bottom of Strawberry Lane)
- 1796 Joan Day book states Elton & Tyndall lease ends
- 1790 Troopers Hill Chimney built around this time for Elton & Tyndall Copper Works?
- 1789 Harfords' & Bristol Brass Company buys Warmley works
- 1788 First public mtg of Bristol Abolitionists.
- 1784 St George civil parish formed
- 1783 Treaty of Paris ends American War of Independence
Crews Hole (and Conham?) Copper Works leased by Elton and Tyndall
Brass company abandon Crews Hole site
- 1780 1780 Copper Smelting moved to Warmley and Crews Hole site leased to various businesses
- 1777 William King, glassmaker dies
- 1774 William Reeve bankrupt, Arnos Vale and Black Castle sold
- 1770 1769 Benjamin Donn's map shows 'The Cupolas' (copper smelters), also Lead Works below the Hill
- 1768 William Champion bankrupt, Warmley Company auctioned.
- 1766 Crews Hole bottle glasshouse advertised for sale occupied by William King & Co
- 1760 Troopers Hill Chimney built around this time for Leadworks shown on Donn's later map?
- 1758 25 March Sir Abraham Elton III sells 'Harris's Hill alias Truebody's Hill' to the Bristol Brass Company (10 acres) (Elton annals report this as 1753)
- 1756 First St George church completed
- 1754 49 copper smelting furnaces reported at Crews Hole
- 1752 Sept - change to Gregorian (New Style) calendar
3 March St George Church foundation stone laid
- 1751 Ecclesiastical parish of St George created
- 1750 William Reeve (1713-1778), manager of Crews Hole copper works builds Black Castle
- 1749 Council complains of waste copper slag obstructing river, manufacture of copper slag blocks started to dispose of this waste material
- 1746 William Champion leaves the Bristol brass company and founds rival 'Warmley Company'
- 1745 Sir Abraham Elton, 3rd Baronet (1703–1761) bankrupt 12 March
- 1742 Sir Abraham Elton, 2nd Baronet (b1679) dies 20 Oct
- 1740 1738 George Whitefield and John Wesley preach at Hanham Mount
- 1733 A Elton (II) & Thomas Coster promote idea of a *brass* statue to William (III) in Queens Square
- 1728 River Avon Navigation opened from Bristol to Bath
Sir Abraham Elton, 1st Baronet (b1654), of Clevedon Court dies 9 Feb
- 1725 Crews Hole producing 150T copper/year from 24 furnaces employing 33 men
- 1720 1720 Share price of South Sea Company (& then other companies) collapses (South Sea Bubble)
- 1717 Abraham Elton created a baronet in reward for his services in the rebellion of 1715
- 1713 South Sea Company granted monopoly (the Asiento) to supply African slaves to the islands in the "South Seas" and South America
- 1712 Crews Hole Copper Works established by Bristol Brass & Wire Company under the control of John Coster and his son Thomas
- 1710 1708 Abraham Darby 'Active Man' (Manager) of the brass company moves to Coalbrookdale to pursue iron smelting.
- 1704 Harris's Hill alias Truebody's Hill' (10 acres) purchased by Abraham Elton from Lancelot Dobson
